We are **not for profit, quasi-public** organizations that function as facilitators for meeting the needs of the local land user in the conservation of soil, water, and other related natural resources.





BUDGET ALLOCATIONS




WHY SHOULD YOU CARE?

- Rhode Island is home to over 1200 farms, and farming is one of the major program areas the districts support.
- The longer farms are viable and sustainable, the greater the benefit for the RI economy.
- Districts are essential for ensuring safe public and private drinking water supplies statewide.
- The districts are REQUIRED to exist by law but are all struggling to currently keep their doors open.

ERICD is so underfunded they will close their doors in 6-12 months.

HOW ARE WE FUNDED?

History of average state funding per district:



THIS FUNDING HAS DECREASED BY **76%**BETWEEN 2006 AND 2015. NO FUNDING
RECEIVED IN 2016.

WHAT WE NEED

- We need base funding in order to keep our doors open and serve the state.
- We need \$180,000 per year, restoring the districts to \$50,000 for each conservation district, which hasn't been seen since 2006, as well as \$30,000 for the RI State Conservation Commission.
- We need the Governor, legislators and other political leaders to understand and support the importance of who we are and what we do.
